
Infant Mortality, Health Care, Medical Facilities

DEPENDENCY RATIO

- # of people who are too young or too old to work, compared to the number of people in their productive years
- Dependents Under 15 and over 65
 - Europe 47%
 - Saharan Africa 85%




Young outnumber the old in Sub Saharan Africa 14:1



INFANT MORTALITY

- Annual number of deaths of infants under 1 year of age compared with total live births
- Expressed as number of deaths among infants per 1,000 births rather than a percentage
- IMR reflects a country's health care system
 - Lower IMR –well trained doctors, hospitals, and medical supplies

INFANT MORTALITY IN THE US



1 IN 15 BABIES DIE IN SUB SAHARAN AFRICA

SURVIVORS STILL FACE PROBLEMS BECAUSE OF LACK OF IMMUNIZATION


1 IN 250 BABIES DIE IN EUROPE





ELDERLY SUPPORT RATIO


- DTM = Increases in the number of elderly
- Income and Medical Care in retirement needed
- ESR = # of working age people (15-64)/# of persons 65 & older
- World Ratio = 9
- 2050 estimated @ 4
- Smaller Ratio means less workers to contribute to pensions, healthcare, etc





HEALTH CARE

- Public Assistance
- Annual per capita expenditures on health care
 - Europe \$1000
 - US \$5000
 - Sub Saharan Africa less than \$100
 - 15 % of Government expenditures in Europe and North America
 - Less than 5% in Sub Saharan Africa and South Asia





MEDICAL FACILITIES

- Europe 50 hospital beds per 1000 / 30 physicians per 10,000
- Sub Saharan Africa, South and Southwest Asia – fewer than 20 hospital beds / fewer than 5 physicians



MEDICAL FACILITIES

- Most Developed countries offer healthcare for little to no cost
 - Europe 70/30
 - Developing Countries- people pay more than half cost of healthcare
- US is the exception US citizens pay
 55% of healthcare and resembles
 patterns in developing countries
